“Finding the Lost and Living”

There are many reasons to search for missing people. They might be heirs to an estate, descendants of early settlers, estranged family members or relatives with family photos or stories. Connecting with living people can also help solve family mysteries and reunite families that have been ‘out of touch’ for years. Junel Davidsen, a professional genealogist and heir searcher, has located many missing heirs in addition to completing client projects like finding the whereabouts of a ‘lost’ father, a half-brother in England and half-siblings of a WWII sailor’s born-abroad son. Recently she found a distant cousin who had photographs of her 2<sup>nd</sup> great-grandfather’s three brothers. Each project is special and unique but there are some common resources and research strategies. In this session, Junel will share some tips for identifying and locating missing people. Some of these tips might also be helpful in tracing elusive ancestors.

[From last Saturday's King City 'Settler' -- One of the prettiest weddings of the year occurred on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence of Mr.&Mrs. Pleasant THOMPSON, in Pine Canyon, the contracting parties being Wm. WEAVER and Miss Janie THOMPSON. The ceremony was performed by Judge E.V. BROWN of King City, after the words had been spoken the friends and relatives, of whom there was a large number present, sat down to the wedding dinner. The tables were loaded down with the good things which Mrs. THOMPSON so well knows how to prepare. All were happy, and the faces of the bride's parents were wreathed in smiles. In the evening the party left for the residence of the bridegroom's brother, where they were given a very enjoyable dancing party.]

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CHARLEY CHAMBERLAIN -- One of the best and most capable men nominated by any party for any office in Monterey County this year is Charley CHAMBERLAIN, the Republican nominee for county clerk. He was born in the province of Quebec 49 years ago. He comes from good old New England stock, his great grandfather having been a major in the Continental army during the war of the Revolution and his grandfather a soldier in the war of 1812. One of his brothers served in the Mexican war under General SCOTT, while himself and 3 brothers served in the Union army during the late civil war. He was discharged from the service Nov. 10, 1865, and came west to Idaho in 1866, where he was county clerk of Lemhi county for 2 terms. He came to California in 1872 and has resided here ever since, with the exception of about 3 years, having been engaged most of the time in farming and dairying in Monterey County. He was tax-collector of this county from 1882 to 1884 and performed the duties of

that office with credit to himself and to the satisfaction of the people. At present he is keeping a small clothing store in Salinas. His integrity is beyond reproach. Possessed of a liberal education and endowed with fine clerical ability, he would make a most excellent county clerk.

C.F. LACEY -- The Republican nominee for district attorney, C.F. LACEY, was born in Salinas City, and educated in her public schools. He worked in his father's blacksmith shop, studied law and was admitted to the bar. He was elected assemblyman by a large majority over his Democratic competitor 4 years ago. He is an expert stenographer, having been the official court reporter here for a number of years, and has the energy, push and knowledge of the law to make a most excellent prosecuting officer. As the 'Index' said when he was nominated for the Assembly, "Claude LACEY's friends are legion and he is bound to be elected."

From last Saturday's Gonzales 'Tribune' -- Frankie, the 6-month-old child of Mr.&Mrs. Frank E. ADAMS, of Chualar, died last Friday evening at that place. The funeral took place in Gonzales on Sunday and was largely attended.

George ELLIOTT, a freight conductor, running out of Oakland, either fell off his train or was thrown off by tramps between Pinole and Rodeo stations last Monday night. The train ran over him, mangling his body in a shocking manner. The deceased was a son of W.T. ELLIOTT of Gonzales and a cousin of C.E. BAINBRIDGE, the Salinas photographer.

\*\*Suicide of J.E. MILLS -- Coroner GORDON and Deputy VANDERHURST were summoned to Castroville, last Thursday to hold an inquest on the body of John Emmett MILLS who had committed suicide. It appears from the testimony given that the deceased after leaving the Native Sons' lodge room the night before, went to his saloon accompanied by 2 or 3 friends, where they remained until 2 o'clock, when MILLS went out on the sidewalk and placing the muzzle of his pistol to his breast fired the fatal shot. He walked into the saloon and sat on a chair leaning his head against the counter. Suddenly he fell back on the floor and was picked up by his friends and taken to a bed, where he lingered until a quarter of 6 Thursday morning when he expired. Deceased was in the 28th year of his age and belonged to the Knights of Pythias and Native Sons, and was well liked by all who knew him. His parents live in Castroville. The verdict of the coroner's jury was to the effect that he died by his own hand while temporarily insane. The funeral took place at Castroville Saturday afternoon.

From last Saturday's Monterey 'Cypress' -- Don Manuel RAMIREZ, a native of California, died in Monterey on Oct. 16th. He was about 84 years of age. As the poor old man died without means, Audel SANCHEZ circulated a subscription list for the purpose of giving him a decent funeral and something over \$20 were subscribed. The funeral took place on the 17th inst., and the remains were laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery.

\*\*Death of William HATTON -- William HATTON, the well known dairyman, died of congestion of the brain at his home in the Carmel Valley last Monday morning. It seems that in returning home from Monterey on Saturday, he was caught in a heavy shower of rain and got wet through. A bad cold resulted, which settled upon the brain and he lost consciousness Saturday night. Dr. HEINTZ of Monterey was summoned and treated the patient until next day, when his condition became so alarming that a telegram was sent to San Francisco for other medical aid and F.S. Use the search boxes at each site. If unsuccessful, using the Advanced Search available on many sites will usually result in "hits" that are closer to your exact area(s) of interest. Once a book of interest is found, you can find a download link. Some sites, such as Archive.org, may offer downloads in multiple formats. If unsure which format to use, select PDF. If you have an ebook reader (Kindle, Nook, iPad, Android), you might prefer a different format. Once downloaded, place the book in whatever location you prefer.

Some of the online sites provide PDF files that can be searched for any word or phrase even after being stored on your own hard drive. Other online sites may not provide PDF files with search capabilities.

Books found at <http://www.Archive.org> usually can be searched for words or phrases even when stored on your own disk drive. Books downloaded in PDF format from Google Books normally are not searchable. Other online ebook sites vary widely. A non-searchable book is still better than no book at all.


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## CLEANING A GRAVESTONE

Stones are composed of minerals and salts. Adding chemicals to them can often cause chemical reactions that will erode the stone faster than if you just left it alone. This damage is not immediately evident, as in the case with bleach being used on marble. The stone is exposed on all sides to the elements. Using bleach will not only give you instant brightness but will cause the stone to change in pallor and most often become rough to the touch. This is because the sodium chloride in the bleach has dissolved the binding minerals and caused the quartz crystals to start to exfoliate. When this process is used on particularly soft marble and limestone, the lettering is the first to disappear. Something that is over 100 years old shouldn't look bright and new. Hélène Desportes, born in 1620, was the first child of French parents to be born in Quebec and to survive. For nine years, she lived in Samuel de Champlain's Habitation. In 1629, the little settlement was captured by the English. Hélène, along with the majority of the other French settlers, was put on an English ship and taken to France. 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### **PRESERVING THE FAMILY BIBLE**

If you possess a family bible or know someone who does, preserve the family information in it before any kind of disaster has a chance to destroy that family bible. Take pictures or scan the inside and outside covers, the title page containing the publication date or copyright, and the family record pages. Make several copies. Take these copies in person, e-mail, or snail mail them to several genealogical and historical societies. Donate copies to museum libraries, public libraries, and genealogical libraries. And, of course, keep copies for yourself and perhaps, give them to other family members and ask that they keep them in a safe place. When you donate the copies of the pages, place a copy in the county you live in, if the ancestors who originally owned the bible lived in another county or state, donate copies where they lived. Make sure to send copies to the Family History Center in Salt Lake City, the Genealogical Center in the Allen County Public Library in Ft. Wayne, Indiana, and your state historical and genealogical societies.

**THE MEANING OF WORDS**

Many different words have been used to describe relationships among family members that would not have the same meaning for us today. For example, in the past, the word cousin was used to refer to any member of a family that is not a brother, son, sister, or daughter, including distant relations. Today when we refer to a cousin, we are usually indicating a first or second cousin. Another common change is with the term in-law. Today we refer to an in-law as a relative of one's spouse. Historically, however, the word in-law was also used to describe step and adoptive relationships as well. The terms brother and sister have also changed. In older documents, brother or sister could refer to a wide variety of relationships, including full siblings, stepsiblings, adoptive siblings (and those of one's spouse). The term is also used to describe brothers and sisters in the church, and is sometimes used as a term of affection for close friends. Another example is the use of the title "Mrs." While today the title is used to assume marital status; in the past it was commonly used as a sign of respect and did not necessarily denote marital status. When evaluating the information in your records, research the meaning of the words used at the period in which the documents were written. Validating your evidence may seem like a cumbersome part of the research process, but it will save you precious time in the end.
